COBI Military Toys

Jeff Duncan forwarded info on some interesting military toys: Hey Guys FYI,

Just found out about (never even heard of these guys before) an amazing toy manufacture based out of Central Europe called COBI, basically a "Lego" style toy that is actually 100% compatible with Lego (get the Lego lawyers on file!) !...but about 2/3 of their catalogue is military based whereas Lego will not do strictly military topics. Everything from Romans/Barbarians, Teutonic Knights, WW2 landing craft, Panzer, Tiger, Matilda, Sherman, T34 tanks, Russian rocket trucks, halftracks, 9 types of jeeps, planes, battleships etc, etc... They must have over 100 sets.

I picked up a few sets and the quality is first rate, similar priced or even a little more expensive than Lego but wow... if I did not already have a hobby I might of started in on this stuff...take a quick peek below.

What's the connection between after-shave and the military? Eduoard Pinaud, a French producer of after shave and colognes, was founded in 1830.

It followed the 1810 introduction of after-shave and cologne for French Hussars. Pinaud was 20 when he arrived in Paris, immediately setting up a business that flourishes today.

Three writers ask the question, do war toys encourage violent behavior and make conflict more acceptable? Or do they offer genuine insights into military history and history itself. Title of the feature is 'More Than Child's Play?' The article, in the December 2014 of the UK magazine History Today, is an excellent survey of war toys in the 20th century. Reference is made to Saki's (H. H. Munro) short story entitled 'The Toys of Peace.' in this satirical story, children given 'peace' toys convert them to war toys. The story was published posthumously as Saki was killed in 1916 by a German sniper during the battle of the Somme.

For members who subscribe to the BMSS Bulletin, you will know that Shamus O. D. Wade passed away late last summer. There's a full-length obituary on the Internet. Shamus started out as an advertising copywriter and 'on the side' he operated a toy soldier stall on the weekends at Portobello Rd., London. He was, according to his obituary, the first person to start a full-time toy soldier international business by mail. He introduced a set of 100 'Nostalgia' sets done in the high-glass Britains fashion covering British Empire toy soldiers and related accessories from 1850 to the end of the Victorian era. Shamus was 86 when he took the last retreat in early September, 2014.

One of the rules of factual writing is don't jot down your assumptions, which are not always factual. Case in point: In the last e-mail column, I identified members Don and Keith Ritchie as father and son. Big oops! for me. They are brothers, and over the years others have made wrong assumptions. My apologies!

Another rule is the precise use of words. In the same column, I incorrectly wrote that QVE toy/model soldiers were made by James R. Shakley. The QVE figurines were from molds which were made by the late Ron Colbeck, Colin Cunningham, the late Alex Sim of North Yorkshire, Bill Purdon and others. To make matters better (note the positive spin) James has been painting and selling toy soldiers for more than 44 years, not 30. He is also a water-colourist of some note creating both military and non-military subjects.

Also in an earlier e-mail newsletter, I wrote up member Richard Evans. His correct military background was with The Essex and Kent Regiment (Canada) and the Cambridge University Rifle Volunteers (UK).

The curse of those who collect plastic soldiers is the curved rifle. Mind you, the Wehrmacht had a rifle with a curved barrel for shooting around corners. (Honest!) At OMSS soldier sales I have sometimes noted figurines from the early 60s by Walter Merten, a now defunct German manufacturer. They made U.S. Army. Bundeswehr and Wehrmacht figures wearing steel helmets and field caps. (Separately, of course!) Their rifles could snap, but didn't bend. I had about 100 of these soldiers.

Speaking of curses, people who dig too deeply into the toy soldier industry often make discoveries about proposed soldiers which never came to market. Case in point: The Herald series of U.S. Civil war troops was to be followed by Zouaves. They never made it to store counters. When I visited the Airfix office in London, I was told by a design manager that First World War British Soldiers in soft officer-style head-dress were to be released soon. Not so.

Hey, this should be all about the fun of toy soldiers. Case in point: Have you ever seen a diorama of a courts martial, a firing squad and the poor s.o.b. at a post? That's my assumption, but I could be wrong...

Editor's note: Airfix did issue a set of WWI British infantry in Field Service Caps in HO scale. I still have some of them (see below). This would have been late 1960s sometime - at the time I had every set of theirs I could lay my hands on. They also put out sets of French infantry in Adrian helmets and U.S. Doughboys in Stetson-style hats. But no opposition—no WWI Germans or Turks, at least in those days. GL
