Did you know?

The Battle of Atlantic lasted the duration of the Second World War in Europe, which officially ended on May 8, 1945 (known as V-E Day).

The Royal Canadian Navy began the war with 13 vessels and 3500 sailors, and ended it as one of the largest navies in the world with 373 ships and more than 110,000 sailors (all volunteers), which included the 6,500 women serving the Woman's Royal Canadian Naval Services.

What's New in the Hobby – May 2023 By Scott Dummitt

For those of you that love ceremonial, like I do, there are several new figures released this month that should be of interest. First off, King & Country has released three new sets depicting Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II as she appeared in her twilight years. Each set presents the Queen in a different coloured dress with matching hat. Surrounding the Sovereign are three of her beloved Corgis. The Queen had loved and appreciated these small Pembroke Welsh Corgi dogs beginning with her first called 'Dookie' in 1933. The set can be purchased for approximately \$105.00 Cdn.



Joining the Royal precession this month is our new Sovereign, King Charles III. In 1971 the Prince was enrolled at the Royal Naval College Dartmouth beginning his education as an officer in the Royal Navy. After completing his training Charles served on the guided-missile destroyer HMS Norfolk, the frigates HMS Minerva and Jupiter. During this time he also qualified as a helicopter pilot operating from the carrier HMS Hermes. In 1976 he was given command of the coastal mine sweeper HMS Bronington which as he has often recounted was one of the happiest times in his life. This new K&C figure of King Charles III shows him in the full dress uniform of an 'Admiral of The Fleet'... the highest rank in the Royal Navy. The new figure will sell for approximately \$75.00 Cdn each.



What's New, continued;

William Britain Limited had a pleasant surprise when they received their shipment of Royal Canadian Mounted Police figure in early. The two new figures portray a present day Male (#10101) and Female (10102) Constable of the force in Ceremonial Dress uniform. First established by the Canadian Parliament on 23 May, 1823 as the North West Mounted Police, the force has proudly served in Canada for 150 years. The force, while a federal police force also operates as a provincial police force in 8 of the 10 provinces and in all 3 territories. It has also served as a Military Provost Corps through the two World Wars overseas and has been involved in training foreign police forces in various countries as well as United Nation commitments. The two figures sell for \$65.00 Cdn each. Britains has also announced that they plan on releasing a new figure of King Charles III, however they are waiting to portray him in the ceremonial outfit he will be wearing during the Coronation on the 6 May 2023. By the way there are supposed to be a contingent of RCMP officers heading the Coronation parade that day.

John Jenkins Designs has just announced that he will be releasing the Queen's Rangers later this year. The figures announced include: Grenadier Company, Light Infantry Company, the Highland Company, and Hussars. As you are aware the Queens Ranger is our Society logo and these figures depict the Ranger unit as it was depicted during the American Revolution. While the regiment was stood down after the conflict, it was later reinstated in Chatham England after the war when Simcoe was made Lt. Governor of Upper Canada and stationed throughout the colony





Worth a Visit – The Ontario Regiment Museum – Oshawa Ontario

The Ontario Regiment R.C.A.C. Museum is home to a historical vehicle collection of over 120 military vehicles. These vehicles include jeeps, trucks, armoured personnel carriers, and tanks, and are all kept fully operational by the Museum's volunteers. In addition to an extensive static display section with artifacts dating up to 200 years ago, the Museum prides itself on making history come alive.

The museum recently received a donation of a very rare WW2 Daimler Scout Car commonly known as a "Dingo". The Daimler Scout Car, known in service as the "Dingo" (after the Australian wild dog), is a British light, fast four-wheel drive reconnaissance vehicle. They were designed in 1938 and saw service with Canada and all Commonwealth countries during the Second World War. Canada produced a version of the vehicle known as the "Lynx", and both served side-by-side with Canadian reconnaissance armoured Regiments during the conflict. The UK built Dingo is very rare as they were exported to every continent during the War with the exception of North America.

This rare Second World War vehicle will be put on display in the *Military Vehicle Conservation Centre* at the Museum beginning March Break 2023 and will be part of regular Museum events and demonstrations moving forward.

Did you know?

There are over 70,000 mailboxes in the U.K. with the Royal Cypher. They won't be changed to reflect the new king. The mailboxes will only be updated with the new cypher as they need to be replaced. Currently only about 60% of the current mailboxes have Queen Elizabeth II cypher, some still have Queen Victoria, King Edward VII, King George V and King George VI. Mailboxes currently under construction will have the Queen Elizabeth II cypher.
