### **Auction Tips from the Auctioneer**

It is a great honour to have been appointed the club's auctioneer again this November.

Having done this for about 10 years now, perhaps I could give you a few tips gained from experience which will help things to move along swiftly and also help your sales.

Firstly, it is imperative that you fill out your seller form completely, especially your seller number and your reserve price if any. If you do not do this, you will be causing confusion and delay. Pack the form with as much information about the item as you can: title, manufacturer, rarity, limited edition, provenance, etc. The more bidders know about it, the more desirable it will be and the higher the price it will fetch.

Do not over-price your item. You're in a room full of experts; they know exactly what it is and how much its worth and they're looking for a bargain. If you start low, you'll be surprised how high bidding can go. As auctioneer, you must remember that I work for the seller—not you. My job is to drive up the price as much as I possibly can and I will not drop the hammer until I have wrung the last possible dollar out of the sale.

Lastly, I would encourage every participant to donate an item for benefit of the club. Mark it clearly "Club Donation". You're getting quite a service here, professional and commission-free. Why not donate an item by way of thanks? It need not be excessive; a stack of books or an unwanted figure kit could put \$5 in the club's coffers and you'll get it back anyway though all the benefits membership offers.

I look forward to the excitement and the pleasure of seeing you all again at this month's auction on the 9th.

### Henry VIII and his two wives (Not six!)

Like many toy soldier collectors, I've always liked historical TV miniseries. But those from the 70's produced by the BBC have a special place in my heart! They almost feel closer to theater plays than actual television. By focusing on talented actors instead of giant sets and special FX, those shows were able to bring back to life some of the greatest names in history. Amongst my favorite shows were I Claudius, Elizabeth R and, obviously, Henry VIII and His Six Wives. So, when King and Country announced his new releases for October and I saw King Henry himself, Anne Boleyn and Jane Seymour, I knew I had to write a bit about this trio!

### **Henry VIII**

King and Country said that the inspiration for this Henry VIII figure comes from various portraits by Hans Holbein the Younger. Holbeing was a German-Swiss painter who became the official King's Painter in 1535. He is considered as one of the most important sources to get an idea of what the royal court looked like during the reign of Henry VIII. Within his production, there is one portrait that really stands out and that is also really close to what the toy soldier looks like in terms of body pose and clothing. The original painting was produced in 1536–1537 and was later destroyed in a fire in 1698. Luckily many copies still exist today.

### Portrait of Henry VIII by Hans Holbein the Younger, circa 1600.

In this portrait, we can see the same outfits as the mini-Henry, but with some color variations. Almost all the colors used on the figure version can be found on other copies of the portrait of the king. Beyond the colors, the shape and body pose are spot on! He looks like a giant square on 2 legs and this is what makes his silhouette so unique!

### **Anne Boleyn**

Anne Boleyn, mother of Elizabeth I and Henry's second wife, is based on various sources for her look. Amongst them, two stand out more than the rest. The first one is a posthumous portrait from 1550 usually on display at the Hever Castle. Many details are still unknown about that portrait, but this painting is currently being analysed by a team of art experts at the University of Cambridge. The results will be shared soon, at the opening of a new portrait exhibition in February 2026 at Hever Castle. In that portrait, she wears dark and red clothes and she carries a red rose, symbol of love and fertility.

When comparing the figure to the portrait, we can easily see major differences. Her hair is light brown instead of almost black, her eyes are blue instead of dark brown and the shape of her face is round rather than a long oval. This is because the second inspiration for that figure is the 1972 tv show "Henry VIII and his Six Wives"! What we have here is in fact the famous British actress Charlotte Rampling! And this is why I got so excited when I saw those toy soldiers!

### Jane Seymour

As you might have guessed by now, Jane Seymour, the third wife of Henry VIII, is also mostly a depiction of the actress Jane Asher as seen in the movie "Henry VIII and his Six Wives".

### Jane Seymour (continued)



Portrait of Jane Seymour by Hans Holbein the Younger, circa 1540. This portrait is more representative of the real Queen.

Also, just like in the show, she wears a green dress. This choice doesn't align with what the average portraits of the queen looks like. In most of the paintings, she can be seen wearing a red dress. Despite this colour choice, she still can be recognized by the iconic shape of her hairdress. Still, imagining her wearing green on a more casual day is still within the realm of possibility.

This is purely speculative, but I assume Waris Hussein, who directed Henry VIII and His Six Wives, wanted to get characters that are visually different, especially as those 2 characters were very close in the timeline. So green was picked for Jane instead of her signature red. Note that that a green dress was also used to depict the queen Jane on an old 1882 illustration in the book "The Costumes of All Nations" by Albert Kretschmer and Carl Rohrbach. Whatever the reason behind this, this gives us 3 visually unique characters that are much more interesting visually when looked at as a

group. It's one of those cases where adapting within the range of "could have been" makes it just better.

### Conclusion

For many years King and Country has been known for adapting some figures so they could be unique and yet appeal to many known references. In this case, it's a matter of historical portraits and a TV show that I really like! As a fan of this series, I can only hope that we will get more characters from that series in the future. Two wives out of six is a good start, but this means that four are still missing!
